The Census Bureau plans to send a letter to every U.S. household. It's part of a once-a-decade tradition of counting every person living in the U.S. Households who do not respond or return a partially filled-out questionnaire by early April (estimating), may start receiving follow up visits from Door-Knockers. These Census workers are trained to conduct Census Interviews and collect responses.

The census asks questions of people in homes and group living situations, including how many people live or stay in each home, and the sex, age, and race of each person. The goal is to count everyone once, only once, and in the right place.

Federal funds, grants and support to states, counties, and communities are based on population totals and breakdowns by sex, age, race, and other factors. Your community benefits the most when the census counts everyone. When you respond to the census, you help your community gets its fair share of federal funds spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works, and other vital programs.

Businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices and stores, and this can create jobs. **Developers** use the census to build new homes and revitalize old neighborhoods. Local **Governments** use the census for public safety and emergency preparedness. **Residents** use the census to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality-of-life and consumer advocacy.

October 20th - November 22nd


- Leaves must be placed at the curb or roadside before the pickup day.

As a reminder, please do not burn leaves within the Villages Corporation Limit. Burning leaves within the Village Limits is illegal. If caught doing so violations can result in substantial penalties.
